





Edmund Higginson (1802-1871) inherited the Saltmarshe estate from his uncle William Higginson in 1812. He built a new house in the Tudor Gothic style sometime between 1828 and 1834, with additions in 1845-46. This rare privately printed catalogue describes the Gallery of 229 pictures in some detail, and in most cases provenance is also provided. "The dispersion of the Collections formed by MM. Boursault, Burtin, Bonnemaison, Lucien Bonaparte, Durand, Delahante, Lapeyrière, and Pourtales, laid the groundwork of the present Gallery; whilst several choice works of Art have been acquired from the Cabinets of the Duchesse de Berri, Mr. Beckford, Lord Camden, Mr. Gray, Mr. Knight, Lord Lichfield, Lord Northwick, Mr. Zachary, and others"—Advertisement. The Gallery was dispersed at auction by Messers Christie, Manson & Wood in two sales June 4, 1846 & June 16, 1860.





Describes the interior and exterior of eighteenth of the most important houses in Hertfordshire. Rare; even though the limitation statement is 200 copies the list of subscribers extends to just 24 names.

A record of the house and its owners, with photographic views of the house and grounds. Many historic owners including Cardinal Wolsey and the Duke of Monmouth whose widow was granted it by James the 2nd in compensation for his harsh treatment of her. Sold by the duchess to Benjamin Styles who was related to the sub Governor of the South Sea Company and who made an enormous fortune out of the South Sea Bubble. Styles employed Giacomo Leoni to create an ostentatious Italianate palazzo. It was subsequently owned by the Grovsvenor family but has for many years housed a golf club.

Cassiobury Park was built in the 1670s by Martin May for the 1st Earl of Essex and remodelled by James Wyatt in 1800. This catalogue is one of several sales held throughout the year listed by Holmes, and marks the end of a notable historic collection. It was demolished shortly after the sales in 1922.





Exceptionally rare; documents work on the house carried out between a fire in 1835 and the death of the 2nd Marquis in 1868.

C. K. Adams' Copy, with his pencil annotations throughout, and his manuscript genealogies loosely inserted. The family collection of the Marquis of Salisbury was one of the most important in private hands when Holland produced his catalogue at the Marquis's request. In 1970 Charles Kingsley Adams was commissioned, with Erna Auerbach, to review and compile a new catalogue of the collection, then housed solely at Hatfield House, his work being published as a standard text the following year. In the compilation of this he reviewed Holland's original work, using as a basis for his own, renumbering the items as set out in this, his working copy which includes his copious detailed notes throughout. Adams, who died in the year of publication, was Director and Keeper of the National Portrait Gallery from 1951 until 1964.



The third separately published monographs in the series initiated by the architect Peter Frederick Robinson (1776-1858) as a sequel to Colen Campbell's original work of 1715 under the title *Vitruvius Britannicus*. The four other titles in this series cover Woburn Abbey, Hardwicke Hall, Castle Ashby & Warwick Castle. Robinson had intended to cover 40 houses and issue one every 6 months—he did not appear to attract the support required to accomplish this.


Produced at the instigation of the 8th Earl of Sanwich who then occupied the house. Lists of the pictures and contents that survived a disastrous fire in the mid 1830s, which is described. Further pictures were lost in recent times when some of them, mainly full lenghts, were in store and burnt in transit while being returned to Mapperton Manor, present home of the family.




The work includes a good account of nearly every important house in the neighbourhood such as Knole and Penshurst and also some of lesser importance.

First edition of this history and guide book to Knole, the ancestral seat of the Sackville family, built in the second half of the fifteenth century and enlarged to its present impressive size in the sixteenth and early seventeenth centuries.

Leeds Castle was the country seat of Charles Wykeham Martin (1801-1870), an English Conservative Party politician who sat in the House of Commons in three periods between 1841 and 1870. Cruttenden had exhibited two of his images of Leeds Castle at the Photographic Society's 1861 Exhibition. Sale advertisement dated May 3rd 1921, when the Wykeham family sold up, pasted in.





Folio (360 x 265 mm), letterpress title page followed by 164 lithographed plates (including one duplicate, Clayton Hall, no. 8 in the series, which is not numbered), some plates tinted, some with light spotting, marbled endpapers, contemporary half hard-grained black morocco, slightly rubbed, marbled edges, spine gilt extra, a nice copy.

This extremely rare and lavish production appears to be a re-issue of Twycross's Lancashire plates, by Bartlett in 1853, without the text. Twycross issued his *The Mansions of England and Wales* in 1846-50, he intended to complete a series of books covering all Counties of England and Wales but due to his death in 1852 he only completed Lancashire, Cheshire and Cornwall. The 164 plates illustrate 126 houses with many being illustrated by two different plates, "these lithographs are exceptionally good and the plates show only country houses."—Cooper.

A scarce photographically illustrated work, Lydiate Hall was a black-and-white half-timbered house which was accompanied by a private chapel. It was a known Catholic house during the time of Elizabeth I of England. It now stands ruined and was given a Grade II listing in 1968.



The only edition of this handsome guide to the historic timber-framed hall of i' th' Wood in Lancashire, which dates back to the sixteenth century. The book was published just after Lord Leverhulme had converted it into a local history museum and handed the house officially over to the Corporation of Bolton.

First published in 1772 with just 60pp, this fourth edition is almost double the size of the third. "From the additions, alterations, and I hope improvements made in almost every part of the book, since the publication of the third edition of 1777, it may perhaps more properly be called a new work, than the revival of an old one." It includes a complete Catalogue of the Pictures, Statues and Busts at Holkham, and of the Curiosities and Paintings at Narford. One of the major changes was to update the description of Houghton Hall, as since the last edition, the 3rd Earl of Orford had sold the collection of old master paintings to Catherine the Great.







George John, 2nd Earl Spencer, who owned Althorp between 1783 and his death in 1834, amassed an extensive art collection and one of the largest private libraries in Europe. The catalogue consists of a listing of 587 pictures with an additional 17 added in a neat contemporary hand.

Thomas Seaton Forman (1791-1850) and his brother William Henry Forman (1794-1869), had a very successful career within the Welsh iron trade. "His wealth also allowed him to purchase Pippbrook House, Dorking, in 1849, and then to indulge fully in his hobby of collecting antiques and objets d'art. He died in 1850 at Pisa, while on a collecting trip to Italy."—(Oxford DNB). The collection then past into the hands of William Henry who had a purpose built museum erected at Pippbrook to house it.



"Upon his death the 'London Illustrated News' informs us that the house was left to Thomas Seaton's widow Elizabeth, but that the residue of the estate, presumably including the contents of the museum were left to William's nephew, Alexander Henry Brown, the eldest son of his sister Helena, who had married a Major Arthur Henry Browne of Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

Before the removal of the contents of Pippbrook House a 'Catalogue of the Works of Antiquity and Art collected by the late William Henry Forman... and removed in 1890 to Callaly Castle, Northumberland' was produced by Major Arthur Henry Browne and William Chaffers. Upon the death of Elizabeth, who had since remarried, the estate was bedevilled by family disputes; Pippbrook House was eventually sold up by order of the Court of Chancery, and the Forman Collection was dispersed at a sale by Sotheby's on 19th June 1899."—Ashton, *Pictures in the Garrick Club.* pp. 266-267.

The Catalogue briefly listing over 4000 items and includes a 32 page glossary of terms used in ancient art.

"John Waldie's own 1859 catalogue of the possessions of Hendersyde provides a good description of the pleasure grounds and describes some of the newer features, such as a recently established north approach, lined with shrubberies and plantations, a number of new estate buildings, many built by local architect, William Cockburn, and a new tunnel under the road which led to the bridge to Sharpitlaw Anna... John Waldie died a bachelor and over the course of the later 19th century and early 20th century, the estate passed to the descendants of his sister Maria Jane and her husband, Richard Griffith."—Historic Environment Scotland website. It is said that Sir Walter Scott was a user of the extensive library.





"A volume of rare engraved views of Scottish country houses, castles, scenery and so on, by the Edinburgh-based engraver Robert Scott (1777-1841), father of the artists David Scott and William Bell Scott. The main ingredient of the volume is a suite which seems originally to have comprised twelve engraved plates, each with an accompanying leaf of printed text. The plates present in the volume, from drawing by C. Cooper, J. Denholm and F. Dick (one dated 1794, two dated 1798), provide perspective views of the following subjects: Aqueduct Bridge over the River Kelvin; Luss (country house



of Sir James Colquhoun); Glasgow Cathedral; Dalhousie Castle; Cathcart Castle, and villa of Cartside; Lee (country house of the Lockhart family); Pennycuick House; Stonebyres (country house of the Vere family); Craigmiller Castle; and Castle Huntley. Plates of Melrose Abbey and Pollock House, described in text leaves, are absent. These are accompanied by engraved perspective views from drawings by Carse and Wilson, of Newbattle House, Hopetoun House, Edinburgh from the North West and Craigie Hall Bridge, presumably from a suite entitled Views of Seats and Scenery chiefly in the Environs of Edinburgh, published in 1795-6 (two of the plates carry 1796 dates). Although neither suite is complete and some engravings have old dampstains, we have not been able to find mention of the principal suite in any obvious work of reference - which is unexpected, for it incorporates printed text and should thus be held in libraries as well as in print collections - and we offer the volume as it is, in the hope that it will find a suitable home."—Hugh Pagan description pasted onto front endpaper.





The 43,440 square foot house was built between 1701 and 1725 by Richard Hill of Hawkstone, while the surrounding estate and landscape gardens were established by his heirs throughout the rest of the 18th century. The present publication, attributed to a female member of the Hill family, focuses on two of the principal tourist attractions on the Hawkstone estate, the ruined mediaval Red Castle and the so-called Bury Wells, the presumed site of a Roman settlement. The book is neatly printed, with attractive lithograph views of the sites discussed, and it is clear that it was issued in a small number of copies only for private circulation at the Hill family's expense. 



His neighbours George Lyleton of Hagley and Lord Stamford of Enville had wealth and built gardens with follies of stone and on a grander scale... It is probable that they were all written by J. Healey. All the gardens still exist, Leasowes in the care of the local authority. Hagley is currently being resorted."—Cooper.
